## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

*The principal's article for our final newsletter for 2022 will be the transcript of the principal's address from our recent Presentation Assembly.*

Good evening students, and staff, parents and carers and our special guests.

I would like to begin by also acknowledging that our presentation assembly is being held on the traditional lands of the Darkinjung people. I also pay respects to both elders past and present and extend that respect to all Aboriginal students, staff and visitors who are joining us today.

It is a truly great thing to be addressing you today at a full presentation assembly. I haven't given a principal's address at an in-person presentation day ceremony since 2019, so it is a huge bonus that we can all be here to take part in it this tonight. That being said, for the first half of 2022 we still felt significant impacts across schools as COVID 19 restrictions curtailed some regular activities and certainly challenged us when staffing our school each day. I would like to recognise the dedication and resilience of our staff team and of course our students and families as we overcame these challenges and had quality learning experiences continue across the school. It was likewise fantastic for us to celebrate our CAPA concert last night, which was a great success thanks to the excellent student performers and hosts, sound and lighting crew and organising students and teachers.

Despite restrictions still existing in one form or another for at least the first part of the year, 2022 has seen some prolific achievements on the part of NVHS students. Our merit presentation assembly this morning recognised hundreds who were highly commended for their effort in class. Likewise, tonight's program details significant academic, sporting, artistic and community service achievements from students across all year groups in the school.

Our school continued to make great progress towards achieving the goals of our 2021 to 2025 strategic improvement plan. The key areas of literacy, numeracy, wellbeing, and effective classroom practice saw a number of initiatives go ahead despite the need to change certain aspects of how our plan was implemented whilst we grappled with day-to-day staffing shortages due to COVID 19. Our attendance initiatives, designed to greatly increase the number of students attending more than 90% of the time, were also very successful. My thanks to the wonderful staff who managed these vital projects. 2023 will see the school embark on a new cycle of planning, which we are very excited about. Our emphasis on supporting the development of skilled, happy and healthy young people who contribute actively to their community will remain very strong.

### Year 10 LoveBites Program

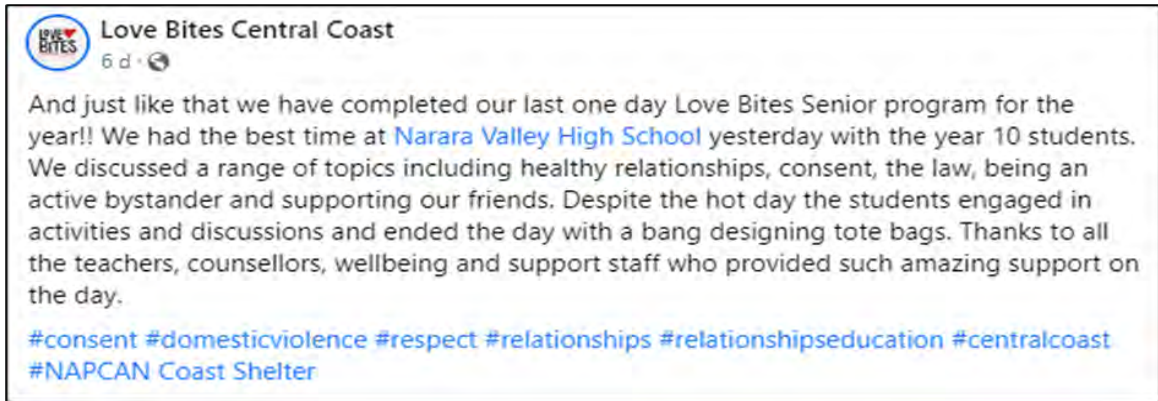

### Wrap up

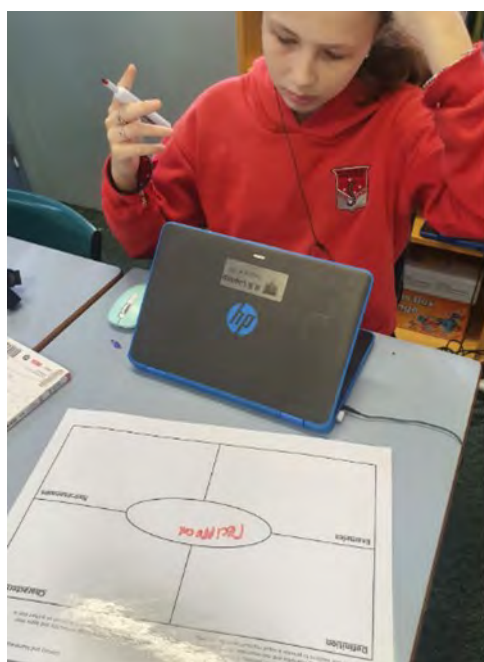
As we come to the end of another busy year, the Literacy and Numeracy staff have been reflecting on our successes and celebrations as a team and as a school. Congratulations to all students on their efforts and achievements this year. It has been very rewarding to be able to have a whole year of learning at school. Despite being faced with the challenges of uncertainties and restrictions at the beginning of the year, and it has been refreshing to be able to return to normal to finish the year together.

Being able to track the data and compare student results from their assessments and exams, such as Check-in assessments, NAPLAN, HSC Minimum Standards to show their progress throughout the year and to see the positive shifts in individual students growth has been very beneficial. We look forward to using this data along with what your teachers and you can tell us about what you need to inform our support in 2023.

While the funding we have enjoyed over the past two years is only for 6 months next year, Mrs Spadina and Mrs Haidar will be back to provide some targeted support for identified groups of students. Ms Hoffman will be beginning her teaching career, so you may see her doing some casual teaching days.

Group tuition cycles have been wrapping up, and have been happy to report the success of the program to parents and students. Delivering the full semester program with a literacy and /or numeracy focus has not only been fun but very satisfying watching the students progress. The small groups allowed rich discussions to prior knowledge of key concepts, as well as a complete monitoring and observation cycle to see where growth has happened. The literacy focus has been on developing knowledge on inference through context clues in text. The students have loved ignition activities included Bananagrams, Freya Model, word cline, a-z vocab game, Jenga. Reading strategies have included skimming and scanning, highlighting key points, inference strategy, activating prior knowledge, re-reading the text, making predictions and summarising. Nearpod was used as a fun tool to help teach inferential comprehension. Writing groups focused on sentence structure, grammar, and vocabulary.

Numeracy groups have focused on Year 8 First Nations students. They have enjoyed number patterns and algebraic thinking, Interpreting and representing data, think aloud, talk moves and inference strategies, utilising Nearpod and numeracy metalanguage. They will be taking home their Plan 2 end of year reports and Personal Learning Plan folios to review with their families/carers. Thank you to Mrs Spadina and Mrs Simmons our Aboriginal Education Officer and our students who have worked together to produce something that sets a high benchmark for next year.

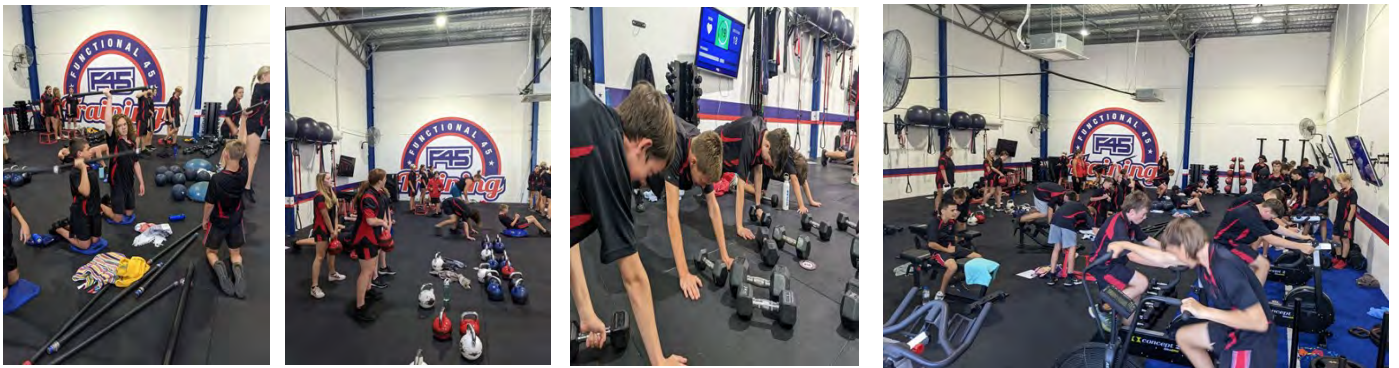

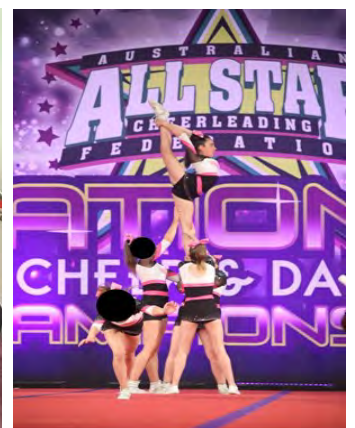
### TSP—Taster Day

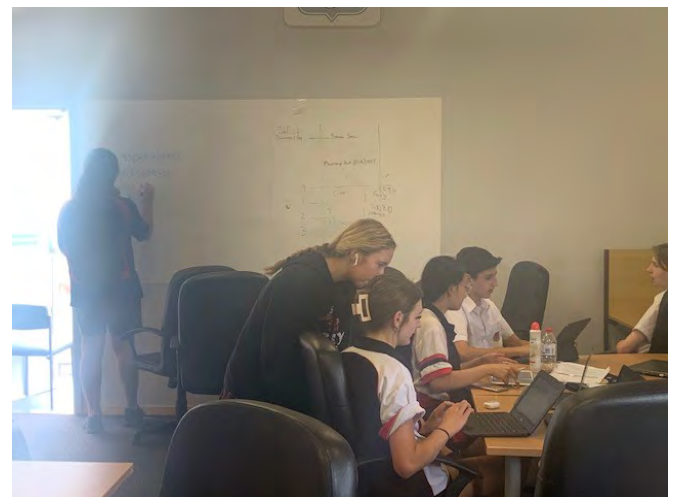

During Week 6, a group of Year 9 and 10 students participated in the Illuminate Education Challenge at Ourimbah University. The challenge is an immersive experience which focuses on students stepping up and taking control of their learning and involves them coming up with a business solution to a problem. This year's problem was to help address the impact the last few years has had on tourism on the Central Coast. Specifically, they had to design a new eco tourism experience to entice visitors to the Central Coast. Over the course of the week the teams had to frame the problem, innovate a solution to the problem, write a business case, create a 12 month profit and loss projection, create marketing materials, prepare a pitch deck presentation and respond to a pressure cooker event. The week culminated on Friday night with a market demonstration, where teams had to set up a stall and sell their idea to the public.

Our Year 10 team developed a wilderness hideaway concept with the inclusion of treehouses as a key accommodation option. Our Year 9 team developed a vertical farm, tour and restaurant business to utilise abandoned buildings in Gosford.

We were so impressed with both teams. They worked incredibly hard, met all deadlines and really stepped up to display strong collaborative skills across the week. A big congratulations to these students.
