<u>NAPLAN</u>

Each year the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy, assesses specific foundational skills of students across Australia. This year, NAPLAN testing starts on March 15th for our Year 7 and Year 9 students. Students will complete four online tests for reading comprehension, writing, language conventions and numeracy across multiple days. The best approach for preparing your child for NAPLAN is to encourage your child to apply themselves as best as they can across the testing days.

How can I get ready for NAPLAN?

Use the demonstration tests to practise the types of questions and tools available in the online tests.


Can I use my own calculator for the numeracy test?

No. The online numeracy test will have an on-screen calculator. Try the NAPLAN online calculator in the numeracy demonstration tests on the public demonstration site.

Do I need to touch type?

No. You do not need to be able to touch type to complete the tests.





What is tailored testing?

The test will change depending on your performance in the test. Questions get easier or harder based on your answers.

Conventions of language test important information

A message will appear on your device to let you know you have finished the spelling section of the test.

Check your answers before selecting 'Yes, I want to start the next section'.

After you select 'Yes, I want to start the next section', the grammar and punctuation section will start. You will not be able to go back to the spelling section of the test.

Information for parents and carers NAPLAN 2023



What is NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) assesses the literacy and numeracy skills of students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.

Students participate in NAPLAN tests in writing, reading, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

NAPLAN provides an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. The tests are just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process – it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance.

NAPLAN also provides schools and education authorities with information about how education programs are working and whether young Australians are achieving important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy.

The benefits of NAPLAN tests online

More precise results with an adaptive design: Tailored tests adapt to a student's performance and ask questions that match the student's achievement levels.

Better engagement: Research into online assessment indicates that students engage well with online tests as the questions are tailored to their achievement levels.

Tailored testing

Tailored testing provides a more precise assessment of a student's performance. Students at each year level start the tests with a similar set of questions. Depending on the number of questions they answer correctly, the next set of questions may be more, or less, difficult.

A student's NAPLAN result is based on both the amount and difficulty of questions the student answers correctly. A student who completes a more difficult set of questions is more likely to achieve a higher score.

Supporting your child

The best approach for preparing your child for NAPLAN is to encourage your child to do the best they can on the day.

Excessive preparation or the use of coaching providers is not recommended.

NAPLAN 2023 test window

From 2023, NAPLAN will be held in March. This change has been made so results can be returned to schools earlier in the year. This will support teachers to understand the learning needs of their students and allow them to plan accordingly.

NAPLAN test window: 15 - 27 March 2023.

The 9-day test window accommodates schools with fewer devices that require flexibility in scheduling.

What if my child was absent on the day of a scheduled NAPLAN test?

Where possible, schools may arrange catch-up tests for individual students who were absent on the day of a scheduled NAPLAN test.

All Year 3 writing catch-up tests must be completed by Friday 20 March 2023.

All other catch-up tests must be completed by Monday 27 March 2023.

COVID-19 advice

Parents should keep students at home if they are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.

Your child's school will be required to conduct NAPLAN testing in accordance with the latest NSW Government COVID-19 advice.

Year 3 writing test

The Year 3 writing test is conducted on paper. All other Year 3 NAPLAN tests will be online.

Students' digital skills

The digital skills required to complete NAPLAN are skills that students use in everyday classroom activities

Students do not need to be able to touch type to complete the test. The online test is not about keyboard skills (just as the paper test was not about handwriting skills).

Withdrawals and exemptions

You can withdraw your child from NAPLAN tests.

A student may be granted a formal exemption if they have:

- significant intellectual disability and/or students with significant comorbidity that severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests, or
- a language background other than English, arrived from overseas and have been attending school in Australia for less than a year before the test.

Contact your child's school for further information and to complete the parent/carer consent form.

Privacy

NESA is responsible for the collection of personal information from NSW schools to be used during NAPLAN testing and reporting.

All data collected for NAPLAN is managed in accordance with NSW and Federal privacy legislation described in NESA's privacy management plan, which can be found on the NESA website:

Results

Parents/carers receive two reports showing their child's achievements in NAPLAN: the individual student report (ISR) and additional student report (ASR). The ISR and ASR should always be interpreted with care. Teachers will have the best insight into a child's educational progress.

Reports are dispatched to schools who then distribute the reports to parents/carers.

DP's REPORT Years 8, 10 & 12

I would like to welcome Year 8, 10 and 12 students back for 2023 and the final year in stage 4 Stage 5 and stage 6 of their education at Narara Valley High School.

It was fantastic to get away with Year 7 students on the Great Aussie Bush Camp. The participation from our students in the various activities I managed to get around to in the three days was amazing. I congratulate all the students who attended the camp on their behaviour and willingness to step out of their comfort zone and participate in activities such as the High Ropes and Giant Swing. I am sure that all the students who attended took away some great memories from the experience.

I would like to thank all the staff who attended the camp. Without dedicated staff members who are willing to spend time away from their own families, opportunities such as this would not be available to our students. On that note I was extremely impressed by our senior leaders whom also attended the camp. They displayed exemplary leadership skills and made the teachers' jobs much easier. I hope they also took away some great memories from the experience.

Year 8 students have settled in to 2023 well, and will have some important decisions to make later in the year as they select which electives they wish to study in Stage 5 (Years 9 and 10). I will provide more information on this process at a later stage, but I advise students start to think about future goals and what courses they may be interested in studying.

On that note Year 10 students also have some extremely important decisions as they approach the end of Stage 5 of their education. It is important that they work on study skills, organisation and setting goals at the beginning of this year to train themselves for senior study in 2024. Again, I would advise Year 10 students to spend some time reflecting on which subjects they have an interest in and any future goals they may have. Spend the first part of this year talking to their teacher about what subjects they can study in Year 11 and 12 and have conversations about whether those subjects are suitable for their personal goals and abilities.

Our Year 12 students are speeding towards the half way point of their final year. I spoke to students at an early roll call to remind them that they have less than 120 school days left and the importance of ensuring that they attend everyone of these days and utilise what little time they have left to reach their potential. We are currently looking at arranging some meeting times near the end of this term to check in with students and see what supports they may need in their final year.

I am looking forward to working with the teaching staff, students and community in providing a fulfilling educational experience in 2023.

I am very proud of the manner in which the majority of Year 11 students have engaged with their studies as our new 'Senior Students' and they are all wearing their Senior Jackets with pride.



Extra-Curricular Activities

In English we offer Public Speaking, Debating, Literacy Week and various competitions that students can enter.

Year 9

Year 9 is in English classes for the first time and settling in well. They are currently studying a unit designed to improve their writing in a variety of settings. They learn about argument, style and intertextuality. Year 9 will complete their NAPLAN examination in Week 7, and the Writing section will contribute to their assessment marks.

Year 10

Year 10 has started with a non-fiction unit of work on Documentaries. Each class is studying a different film, such as Chris Hemsworth's "Limitless". The classes are studying how filmmakers employ different techniques to create an argument and influence our point of view. Their assessment is to create a presentation influenced by their class documentary.

Year 11

Year 11 English Studies Mandatory Module is the World of Work, looking at different texts. Both Advanced and Standard do the compulsory Reading to Write where we study a range of short texts in different styles and learn how to write in those styles using a variety of techniques. Advanced then move on to The Great Gatsby and Standard do a verse novel.

Year 12

All courses are completing their second topic. Standard are completing a close study of the film "The Truman Show", while Advanced are completing a critical study of Great Expectations. They will be assessed by completing a Multi-Modal Presentation in Week 7.

PE UNIFORM

White Card - Thursday 16 March 2023

A course has been organised for students who expressed an interest via a google form, the link to which was emailed home to all students and parents in Years 10 to 12. Notes have been issued to these students. There are a few places left. If any other student is interested, they need to drop into the careers office to pick up a note. The course will start at 7.30am in TAS 9 and costs \$100 to be paid in advance at the office or online.

Central Coast Career Pathways EXPO – Tuesday 4 April 2023

The CCCPE is the region's biggest expo event! Attracting over 3,500 Year 10, 11 and 12 students from across the Central Coast each year, the expo gives these students the opportunity to gather information from over 200 exhibitors about the careers, courses and jobs they are interested in. Exhibitors are grouped into 17 industry areas – including employer and professional associations, TAFE, universities, colleges, training providers and employment agencies.

We have space for 50 students to attend. Notes were emailed home and are also available from the Careers office. The cost of \$20 covers bus to and from the venue, and entry fee. It is a whole day event, and we have booked NVHS into a extra session. The Skills and Thrills Showcase will be presenting with their LIVE band and a demonstration of the positive aspects and opportunities within the VET sector.

USI

All students should have a USI. A USI is an individual education number for life. It also provides students with an online record of all vocational education and training (VET) undertaken in Australia.

If you're at university, TAFE or doing other nationally recognised training, you need a USI. Without one, you can't get Commonwealth financial assistance or your qualification or statement of attainment.

Year 10 students will need to create their USI (link: https://www.usi.gov.au/) and record it on a google form so we have a record for easy access when choosing a VET course or applying for TAFE courses, white card courses or first aid courses while at school.

School Based Apprenticeship / Traineeship

NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

In 2023 the following vaccines will be offered:

If your child is in Year 7 or Year 10 this year, you can now provide online consent for their routine school vaccinations. In Year 7, students are offered free vaccines for diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (dTpa) and human papillomavirus (HPV). In Year 10, students are offered the meningococcal ACWY vaccine.

Vaccination will only be provided at school if consent has been received.

How to provide consent:

- 1. To complete online consent for your child's school vaccinations, visit: https://nswhealth.service-now.com/school
- 2. Follow the steps to log in to your existing ServiceNSW account. This is the same account you may already use to renew your driver's licence. If you don't have a ServiceNSW account, refer to ServiceNSW to create one.
- 3. Update or confirm your personal details in ServiceNSW as required.
- 4. Complete the School Vaccination Consent Form for your child/ren. You will need to:
 - a) Enter your child's personal details
 - b) Provide the Medicare card details for you and your child
 - c) Read the linked Parent Information Sheet and privacy statement
 - d) Provide consent

If you or your child do not have a Medicare card, consent can still be provided by requesting a paper-based consent form directly from your child's school.

The benefits of providing consent online:

- easily update your child's details
- receive SMS and/or email notifications when vaccinations are given
- faster upload of vaccination records to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR).


