### **DP REPORT Year 7**

#### **Numeracy and Literacy Success**

In Semester 1 our Year 7, 8 and 9 students completed their NAPLAN and Check-In assessments. NAPLAN results were sent home to parents and carers in Week 2. We have been thrilled with our students' results. Our Year 8 students have demonstrated numeracy and literacy skills that are well above similar schools and have also exceeded state average in vocabulary, comprehension, measuring and geometry. Our Year 8 cohort have also shown incredible growth across all numeracy and literacy areas over their 18 months at high school. We have also been impressed with our NAPLAN results from our Year 7 and 9 students with many students achieving high bands for reading, writing and numeracy. We are very proud of our students' efforts.


### WELFARE REPORT


